

JAGM was back with a good size group for the annual WI. Several cars stopped at Sturgeon Bay for lunch Lap the Lake Rally. We had 14 Jaguar club members in and sight seeing. On the tip of the Sturgeon Bay Penthe group this year. JAGM accounted for 7 of them, the largest single portion of the group. Cars came from NC, RI, NY, WI, IL, IN, and 50% from MI.

Lapping Lake Michigan takes about 1000 miles spread out from Monday thru Friday, with roughly 200 miles per day. Sunday and Saturday are travel days getting to and from the Rally. All cars are welcome on the Rally as long as they are street legal, licensed and insured.

We all met at the starting point in Evanston, IL, just North of Chicago, on Monday morning, had breakfast and a group orientation. De-

tailed turn by turn directions are provided for everyone. You can follow them if you choose to do so or meet up for dinner at the next hotel. There is no pressure to keep a schedule. If you don't show up by evening, there might be some phone calls made.

Hemming's was a sponsor this year and may have had a chase vehicle following the group. Friends and Club Members usually broke up into small groups to travel together. The JAGM people pretty much stuck together. We didn't have to tour through Chicago but traffic for the first hour was not pleasant. The traffic cleared as we neared Wisconsin. The first night, we only made it as far as Port Washington, WI. There was a list of Activities and Lunch suggestions provided for

the day. On the way there we did stop at the Harley Davidson Museum in Milwaukee. It was very impressive.

Tuesday we traveled to the tip of Sturgeon Bay Peninsula to spend the night at Sister Bay,



JAGM Scores a Hat Trick at the Mad Dogs and Englishmen Car Show Weekend

This year, primarily because Jaguars were being highlighted, we included the Mad Dogs and Englishmen's Saturday morning Rally in our weekend of events. So some people drove to Kalamazoo on Friday afternoon and checked into the hotel to avoid departing from home in the wee hours Saturday morning. For those traveling to Kalamazoo Friday afternoon, we enjoyed dinner at the Texas Corners Brewery, a converted church. It was a unique place with a good food and drink menu.

The first score of our hat trick happened Saturday morning when we drove over to DeNooyer Jaguar.

There we lined up at about 10:30 AM along with lots of other British cars. After a short wait and a driver's meeting, the Rally was underway. This Rally was not a race nor a time-speed-distance event. It is a drive following terse instructions and clues to things you should look for and record. At the start you were given your first-leg driving instructions (turns only, without distances between, for example, R Yankee Spring Rd, Turns into Norris Rd, Thru Village) and a Bingo-styled card with 24 things you were to look for on the route. You simply cross off the ones you spotted and turn in your card at the last

stop. Those who found the most sightings won prizes. After a very nice drive on twisty back roads, we arrived at our first stop - Dean's Ice Cream adjacent to the City Park in Plainwell.

We departed the first stop after having some hot dogs, hamburgers, and/or ice cream. You were able to leave after you received your second-leg driving instructions. The second segment of roads was also a

very nice drive. This route ended at Chief Noonday's Car Park. That was a set of new buildings where you could store and/or work on your car(s). Being located within 20 miles of the Gilmore Museum makes it convenient for some overflow vehicles to be stored there.

Our third and last drive was again on nice back roads and around lots of scenic water. The final destination was a historic park - Charlton Park, near Hastings.

The stops will be as follows:

in their car show. We will have to pay \$5 admission to view the show. I stopped by to check it out. Jack Frost has quite a museum set up with about 20 very nice cars and memorabilia. They have service bays for servicing the public's cars. It is a large spread with plenty to see and do.

2. The Loren Andrus Octagon House, 57500 Van

Dyke Ave, Washington, MI (10:30 to 11:45). The central staircase up to the cupola is worth the trip in itself. The House, built in 1861, was scheduled for demolition a while



ago, but it has been completely restored and furnished in period furniture.

3. The Romeo Historic Society, 290 N Main Street,

Romeo, MI (12:00—1:15). They have so much information on the local foundry that made engines for Henry Ford and the Model



T and the rich history of the area including the underground railroad that passed through the area. A few blocks away, they have the oldest house in the area set up as it was in its day.

 The Rochester Hills Museum at the Van Hoosen Farm, 1005 Van Hoosen Road, Rochester Hills, MI

(1:30—2:30). The 1840 farmhouse is open for tours showing how the farmhouse was run along with



displays on the early history of the Rochester area. All the barns across the road also are filled with displays.

The Stony Creek Roadhouse, 3000 26 Mile Rd, Shelby Twp, MI (3:00 to 9:00). They are known in in the area for a very comfortable atmosphere and plenty of good food.



There could be a \$5 entry fee at each stop. There will also be a \$20 per car wager to get involved in the poker hand challenge.

The plan is to spend just over an hour at each site with about 15 minutes travel time. We will be at the Jack Frost Museum when they first open at 9:00 and will finish at the Van Hoosen Farm as they are closing at 3:00.

Vintage Sports Car Racing Put-In-Bay Airport, OH Tuesday to Thursday, September 17th to 19th

Beginning in 2009, the Put-in-Bay Road Races Reunion celebrates sports car races that were held on the streets of the town of Put-in-Bay on Ohio's South Bass Island from 1952 to 1959 and in 1963.

The threeday reunion engages racers and non-racers alike in an event that reaches back in time to capture the history and re-create the atmosphere of sports car racing of that era in a uniquely beautiful setting.

Book-ended around two days of Vintage sports car racing at the island's airport, is a balanced mix of events honoring the island's racing history, a few social gatherings, a car show, original course controlled laps and airport-track lapping, self conducted island rally, rocker cover races and plenty of unstructured time as well.

Put-in-Bay is a nostalgic island enclave and a short ferry ride off the shore of Lake Erie near Sandusky, Ohio. A summer resort community little changed from the '50s, it is one of the very few places in North America where post-war sports cars raced through

> towns and countryside on public roads and where those roads exist today virtually unchanged.
