Jaguar Classic at Coventry, England

We had the pleasure of visiting the Jaguar Classic facility in Coventry, England in August as part of our 6 week European trip. The newly opened facility is a testament to Jaguar's commitment to preserving and celebrating its storied past, while also showcasing its

craftsmanship and dedication to excellence.

We were warmly greeted by Lisa Cottrell, the VIP Sales and Events Coordinator, who provided an overview of the day's itinerary and the small group tour.

She introduced me to Graham Harvey, the tour guide, the original, ensuring they are virtually indistinguishawith deep insights into Jaguar's rich history and the vehicles on display. The tour began in the workshop where Graham guided us through the various stages of restoration, from the initial assessment of a vehicle's condition to the final touches before it leaves the workshop. It was fascinating to see the blend of traditional craftsmanship with modern technology, as original tools and methods are used alongside contemporary equipment to ensure authenticity and precision.



Next, we moved to the showroom, a space that truly encapsulates the allure of Jaguar's heritage. Among the highlights were the four continuation models produced by Jaguar Classic: the D-Type, XKSS, Lightweight E-Type, and C-Type. Continuation vehicles: 1. D-Type: originally produced between 1954 and 1957, the D-Type is one of Jaguar's most famous racing cars, known for its victories at Le Mans. The continuation models are built to the exact specifications of the originals, right down to the rivets and materials used. 2. XKSS: The XKSS is a road-going version of the D-Type, with only sixteen original units ever produced. The continuation models faithfully recreate this rare gem, offering a driving experience that is as close to the 1957 originals as possible. 3. Lightweight E-Type: A racing variant of the iconic E-Type, the Lightweight E-Type is a masterpiece of engineering. The continuation models are crafted using the same techniques as

ble from the 1963 versions. 4. C-Type: The C-Type was Jaguar's first Le Mans winner, and the continuation models celebrate this achievement with exacting attention to detail. Built to the same specifications as the originals, these vehicles are a true homage to Jaguar's racing pedigree. Along with the Jaguars, the facility also houses a collection of historic Land Rover models, reflecting the brand's rich off-road heritage.

The restoration process begins with every component examined, repaired, or replaced as needed. The goal is to restore each car to its original specification, using as many original parts as possible. Where new parts are needed, they are crafted using the same methods and materials as the originals, ensuring authenticity. The level of detail extends to the finishes as well, with paint work and upholstery meticulously recreated to match the original factory standards. The result is a vehicle that not only looks and feels



like it did when new, but also drives as it would have in its heyday.

My visit to Jaguar Classic was thoroughly enjoyable, and is highly recommended for any Jaguar enthusiast. The new facility offers enthusiasts the opportunity to experience these legendary vehicles as they were meant to be.

Michigan Central Train Station Tour

On July 20, there were 20 of us from JAGM that went eral owners with plans for its use, but none of them to visit the refurbished Michigan Central. The Station

took hold. The building was left unused and open at

times to urban explorers, scrappers, and vandals. All the windows in the 12-story building had been broken out. The last owner was Matty Maroun who bought the station in 1995 primarily for the two existing 2 train tracks outside the building. There had been 14 sets of tracks originally. The Detroit City Council ordered the Station to be torn down and were going to use Federal Money to do so. The station was already on the National Historic Registry so that was not allowed. In an immense deal, Matty Maroun installed

opened initially in 1913 and was a good example of fine architecture with marble and terracotta everywhere you could see. At the peak of its use there were 200 trains and 4000 people passing through the station every day. The last train passed through the Station in 1983. Since then, there were sev-



1000 new windows and traded the Station for city property that he needed to build his new Ambassador Bridge. Ford bought the station and 30 acres of property including several other buildings with plans to restore the building to its former glory. That restoration of the foundation, structure and first floor took a great deal of effort. 6.5 million gallons of water had to be pumped out of the basement. Once completed it was found that the foundation was in bad condition and had to be rebuilt. The Station originally cost \$3 million to build in 1913. Ford acquired it and the ad-

joining properties for \$97 million and so far, \$900 million has gone into the restoration.

Some people have returned parts of the station so that it could be put back in place. Some people took artifacts for safekeeping and have returned them. Some ornamental parts were borrowed from people who now had them. They were scanned and 3D printing was used to recreate the pieces in steel, brass, plastic, or plaster. When the recreated ceiling rosettes, archway figures and other pieces were pointed out as being recreated and not the proper material, you could never tell. There is a list of critical items that the Station would really like returned. There aren't enough detailed photos of the original station giving enough detail to recreate them again. Rebuilding the large clock above the ticket windows was a difficult task, since very few original parts and materials were left.

Where the original wooden benches used to be in the great hall, there was an incomplete floor. Those areas were filled in with Terrazzo flooring that matches the adjoining marble flooring. Glass, with the area of two football fields was replaced, not counting all the earlier exterior windows.

The top of one of the pillars supporting the building was in such bad shape that it had to be replaced. Through research, they found the original granite quarry in Ohio which had been closed. A road was built to get into the quarry where a replacement piece of granite was harvested, returned, carved to match, and set in place. The old section is sitting outside the station and measures about 5'x5'x5'.

The last the Station will be open for public tours will be Labor Day Weekend, Friday through Monday. After that, the public will not be allowed inside the building until 2027. None of the upper floors have had any restoration work done. They will be cleaned up and finished by the tenants of each floor. The top 3 floors will become a hotel. Google will have a floor to themselves, and Ford Advance Vehicles will utilize two or three floors. Anything that is left will be availa-

ble for rent. Once the building is occupied, the lobby will again be available for public use, including a luncheon counter, just like it was in the old days.

When I was there with JAGM and a later trip, I took over 100 photographs of the building. They should be available on the JAGM website for your viewing. Some were photos of the building in its glory, some before restoration and some after restoration. There was a gift booth selling tee shirts. I asked if there would be a book available showing the restoration story with before and after photos. I was told that was coming later this fall. Currently on Facebook, there is an official site for Michigan Central Station Virtual Museum which shows a lot more than we





were able to see in person.

As usual, we had to stop for lunch. We had a great lunch at Mercury Burger and Bar, right across Rosevelt Park from the Station. With the beautiful weather, outdoor picnic table seating worked out very well.

has been through some bad times, at one point scheduled for demolition. Friends of the Octagon House pulled together, rebuilt the central staircase and restored the house and grounds to its former glory, fully furnished. Walking through, the floor layouts look unusual, but make very good use of the available space. With modern furniture, it would still be considered an acceptable house today by most standards.

We are running out of destination trips to entertain us for a good portion of the day, so I started linking several together and created a Poker Run with an hour or so at each stop. You get one poker card at each stop, and we check the poker hands at the last stop. It keeps you moving and if you need to see more, you can always return on your own.

Our first stop was at the Jack Frost Auto Museum which was also hosting a Charity Car Show. Jack Frost made a name and financial business of proving lighting for movies and stage shows through the early years of TV and movies. They had a very interesting collection of about 25 unusual cars. They usually display one at Au-

torama every year. Besides the car collection there was the historical background of Jack Frost Lighting Co. and their vehicles restoration garages. With the charity Car Show there was another group of 50 interesting cars that were brought in for the day.

From there it was on to the Lauren Andres Octagon House originally built in 1861. Several guys started a bet between themselves as to who could build the most unusual house. There may have been a few beverages involved. The Octagon House won. The house

Then it was on to the Romeo Historic Society. They have three separate buildings. Their main building is the old State Police Station in downtown Romeo. A few days before our arrival a water pipe broke, did some flooding but no artifacts were lost. There is a fully funcwhich takes quite a bit of time to open it up. We went to their historic house. We started out looking at the neighborhood houses and how so

many were built with the Greek Revival theme during that period. We toured the historic house, and it looked like it belonged back 100 years ago. Our host filled us in on the history of Romeo, the early industries, railroad lines and transportation system. The early engine blocks for the Model T Ford were built in Romeo until they couldn't handle the volume. Then Ford developed their own foundry and hired the Romeo workers to man and operate it since they were so skilled.

The fourth stop was the Rochester Hills Van Housen Farm. We were not able to tour the actual farmhouse but there were a lot of displays set up inside the barns giving the history of the area, the nearby mills, farming and other businesses.

The final stop was the Stoney Creek Roadhouse, well known in the area for good food and casual dining. We had a group of about 20 for a very nice meal. When checking the poker hands, there was one person with two pairs and two people with one pair. A pair paid out \$20 so Tim and Tina were the big winners with \$40. Does anyone know of a series of interesting places nearby where we could run another Poker Run?

Vintage Sports Car Racing, Put-In-Bay Airport, OH Tuesday to Thursday, September 17th to 19th

Beginning in 2009, the Put-in-Bay Road Races Reunion celebrates sports car races that were held on the streets of the town of Put-in-Bay on Ohio's South Bass Island from 1952 to 1959 and in 1963.

The threeday reunion engages racers and non-racers alike in an event that reaches back in time to capture the history and re-create the atmosphere of sports car racing of that era in a uniquely beautiful setting.

Book-ended around two days of Vintage sports car racing at the island's airport, is a balanced mix of events honoring the is-

land's racing history, a few social gatherings, a car show, original course controlled laps and airport-

track lapping, self conducted island rally, rocker cover races and plenty of unstructured time as well.

Put-in-Bay is a nostalgic island enclave and a short ferry ride off the shore of Lake Erie near Sandusky, Ohio. A summer resort community little changed from the '50s, it is one of the very few places in North America where post-war sports cars raced through towns and countryside on public roads and where those roads exist today virtually unchanged.

Last year a few members joined veteran attendees Mike Bailey and Kris Whise for the island reunion. This year Phil Crutchfield, Ellie and I plan to join in, and we welcome all others who would like to explore this bit of history with us.
